And surely ye'll be your <u>pint</u> stowp! And surely I'll be mine! And we'll tak a cup o'kindness yet, For auld lang syne.

And surely you'll buy your pint Tankard and surely I'll buy mine! And we'll take a cup of kindness yet, for auld lang syne.

We twa hae run about the braes, And pou'd the gowans fine; But we've wander'd mony a weary fit, Sin' auld lang syne.

We two have run about the hillside, and pulled wild daisies; but now we are separated by distance From those days now in the past.

We <u>twa</u> hae paidl'd in the burn, Fae morning sun till dine; But seas between us braid hae roar'd, <u>Sin'</u> auld lang syne. We two have paddled in the stream, from morning until lunch; but oceans now lie between us since those days now in the past.

And there's a hand, my trusty fere! And gie's a hand o' thine! And we'll tak a right gude-willie waught, For auld lang syne.

So take my hand, my trusty friend! and give your hand to me! and we will take a hearty drink together, In memory of those days now in the past.

Running around the hillside and paddling in the stream are symbols of lost youth. With oceans now between us and being separated by distance, the past and the present are joined for this fleeting moment. Though separated by time and space, we can still raise our glasses together and remember our friendship and the times we spent together.

All this is done in the purest folk idiom, with no abstract statements or generalizations, except for the chorus itself, which states in simple but powerful terms the guestion that lies at the heart of so much human emotion." Time and distance lie between many long-lost friends and us and nostalgic memories; between many dear friends and us we have not yet met and nostalgic memories we have not yet lived.

- 3. **Debt** Increase the debt to an unsustainable level. That way you are able to increase taxes, and this will produce more poverty.
- 4. **Gun Control** Remove the ability to defend themselves from the government. That way you are able to create a police state.
- 5. Welfare Take control of every aspect of their lives (Food, Housing, and Income).
- Education Take control of what people read and listen to – take control of what children learn in school.
- 7. **Religion** Remove the belief in God from the government and schools.
- Class Welfare Divide the people into the wealthy and the poor. This will cause more disconnect, and it will be easier to take from (tax) the wealthy with the support of the poor."
